Getting Acquainted with the Radford's by Carolyn Radford

We began life very far from each other. Lloyd was born on May 12, 1941 in El Paso, TX. There was a fire in the hospital the day he was born. I was born July 1, 1942 in Salem, OR. It was the hottest day of the year. Lloyd's Dad was a signal maintainer for Southern Pacific Railroad, so they were moved a lot between New Mexico, Arizona and California. In Watsonville, CA, Lloyd graduated from high school, then attended BIOLA (now BIOLA University) for 2 years. He then went to Cabrillo Community College for only one term because he ran out of money (no available student loans, etc.). An old BIOLA roommate told Lloyd about an opening for

someone to run the print shop at Multnomah School of the Bible (now Multnomah University). He applied, got the job and moved to Portland, OR.

I grew up on a farm between Aumsville and Stayton, OR, and accepted Christ at the Aumsville Community Church (later Bethel Baptist) during an evangelistic meeting when I was 6 years old. The speaker spoke very plainly about heaven and hell, and I sure didn't want to go to hell. I attended Aumsville Grade School for eight years and four years at Cascade Union High School. After I graduated in 1960, I attended Multnomah School of the Bible for 1.5 years until I ran out of money (almost no student aid). I worked for a year earning more money for school, which included some farm work hoeing and training pole beans, marionberries, etc. Most of the money was earned working at Stayton Canning Co. where I stood scouring rust off cans of beans, corn, etc., that had gotten rained on when the roof blew off the cannery during the Columbus Day storm...an actual hurricane on October 12, 1962.

I finally got back to college for a second semester in 1963.

Shortly after I got back to school, a young man by the name of Lloyd Radford arrived from California to run the print shop. We met at Mrs. Samuel's dinner table (the Dean of Women). When dating, I still remember one morning while parting ways after breakfast at the school cafeteria, I met a friend of mine, Kathy Fish, on my way to get my books for class. She asked, "Where did you find him?" I told her and she commented, "What a hunk of a man!" We met in February, became engaged in June, and were married at Aumsville Bethel Baptist Church on October 12, 1963. I never made it back to school because they would not allow newlyweds to attend classes for one year after they were married.

By the time the year was up we had realized we could not make it on what Multnomah paid. We moved to Salem where Lloyd got a job doing printing for the State of Oregon. He soon learned of a job running the print shop for the Oregon National Guard. He ran their print shop for 32 years as a civilian state employee. As with many companies, being on the top of the pay and benefits scale is too costly, so his position was eliminated. He went on to work for Lazerquick, drove a school bus and did janitorial work until he could retire.

We have two children, Stephen and Lanae. Stephen and his wife, Shirley live in Troutdale. She works at CBNW and is often involved with Tadmor. Stephen works

on a free-lance basis in television production for the Blazers, Microsoft and many others. His job has taken him all over the states, China, Amsterdam and a few other places. They have three children, Robert, Austin and Sabrina. Our daughter, Lanae, and her husband, Rod, live in Lebanon. They have adopted 2 boys, Timothy and Isaiah. Timothy turned out to have a rare chromosome disorder, often known as Dupe 15. Lanae and Rod have been through some very difficult times, but it has opened up a ministry among families with disabled children of many sorts.

I went back to college when our daughter was a senior in high school. I have worked as a victim advocate for the Marion County D.A., then I spent a couple of years as a full-time paid worker on a crisis hotline in Salem. I also worked in the English As A Second Language Program for Chemeketa Community College.

We belonged to Salem First Baptist Church for over 25 years then changed to Grace Baptist Church. In both churches, Lloyd served as a deacon and Carolyn as a deaconess. Both of us have served in various Sunday School and Children's Church ministries. At times we have led small adult groups.

We have been married for 57 years. There have been many struggles and many joys along the way. Perhaps our greatest blessing is that our children and grandchildren have remained faithful to the Lord. We have always enjoyed camping with our family and with the two of us. Lloyd has enjoyed photography and some woodwork. I have enjoyed sewing, doll making and oil painting.

Lloyd has had two kinds of cancer and has been cancer free for several years. Four years ago, I had a heart attack caused by aortic stenosis, and underwent aortic valve replacement surgery.

Through all the hills and valleys of life, the Lord has been with us all the way, and I am sure He will be with us until the end.
